## January 29<sup>th</sup> - Eastrose Unitarian Universalist, Portland



Speaking engagement – Shared my life story and talked about the importance of meeting our "others" in order to see them as humans.

#### February 10<sup>th</sup> - Congregation Beth Israel, Portland



Speaking engagement – Shared my life story and discussed how life in Israel is both complex and magical.

#### March 18<sup>th</sup> - Temple Beth Tikvah, Bend



A 3-hour workshop for the Jewish community in Bend, OR. It was a great success, with more than 50 people in attendance. At the end of the workshop, we all held hands and envisioned their community communicating better and better by

repeating this kind of work. Afterwards, many participants said to the group,

to me, and to the leaders that they want and need to continue this work of listening, both inside and outside their community. During their follow-up meeting to plan the future of the community, some community members shared the following about the workshop:

#### "Stupendous success"

"I left my time with Elad feeling inspired to listen more than to talk. I was also further inspired to seek out those in my community and my country who have differing views, differing experiences, and differing backgrounds than myself. I was inspired to see their humanity and to seek out our similarities."

The energy of the room completely shifted during the session with Elad. People came in with chatty, superficial connection, mostly from their head. During the workshop, the community grounded themselves and became present. At the end, the energy was heartfelt connection with people feeling truly heard. Or I could just say God walked into the room."

Upon following up with the community six months after, I learned that the Beth Tikva community has been continuing their listening work within the community.

"Your guest lecture in my class HIST 340 (History of the Israel/Palestine Conflict) was extremely important and useful for my students. You brought a perspective that they would never have been exposed to: that of an Israeli, of North African origin, who had served in the IDF and become a peace activist. I know (from conversations with students) that they especially enjoyed hearing about the experiences of your family as they migrated from Morocco to Israel in the 1950s, as well as hearing how you came to become a peace activist, and what that means for your outlook on Israeli-Palestinian co-existence. It is one thing for students to study a subject from books and other materials, but especially in the case of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, it is vitally important that students have a chance to interact with articulate Israelis and Palestinians.
